About the National FGM Centre

The National FGM Centre is a partnership between Barnardo's and the Local Government Association (LGA) to achieve a system change in the provision of services for children and families affected by Female Genital Mutilation (FGM), Child Abuse Linked to Faith or Belief (CALFB), Breast Flattening and other harmful practices. The Centre works closely with key partners from local authorities, health, education, police, and the voluntary sector to achieve its vision and aims.


The National FGM Centre's Vision is to keep children, young people and families safe from FGM, CALFB, breast flattening, and other harmful practices, including ending new cases of FGM by 2030. Through our work we aim to:

- Prevent new cases
- Protect children and young people
- Support those affected by FGM, CALFB, breast flattening and other Harmful Practices
- **Partner** to deliver services and learn

Specialist social workers provide support in cases where FGM, CALFB, breast flattening or other harmful practices are a concern. This can range from advice and guidance to frontline professionals, to consultancy in child protection proceedings and applications for FGM Protection Orders.

Training is delivered multi-agency and provides space for thought and reflection to enhance practitioner learning

The interactive Knowledge Hub provides a "one-stop shop" for quality assured national and international guidance, information and resources regarding FGM, Breast Flattening and Child Abuse Linked to Faith or Belief.





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Identifying, Supporting and Protecting Girls and Women from FGM

1/2 Day Full Day



Aim: To enhance the understanding and skills of all professionals to act appropriately and confidently to protect and support girls who are at risk or have been subjected to FGM and/or breast flattening.

This training is designed with the needs of all professionals working with girls and their families in mind.

It explores the roles and responsibilities of different professionals and the processes for working cases of FGM. The training encompasses reflective practice, enabling a practitioner to consider holistic risk assessment and support for families affected by the practice. The training also explores the **mandatory reporting duty** as it applies in England, Northern Ireland and Wales for teachers, health professionals and social workers, and can focus on the laws that apply in Scotland, as well as legislative measures in place to support and protect girls and women at risk such as FGM Protection orders.

The training can be bespoke to specific professional settings.

Learning outcomes:

- ☑ Gain a greater understanding about what FGM is, reasons for the practice, prevalence and the impact on girls' and women's lives
- ☑ Understand the context of FGM within harmful practices to improve holistic safeguarding
- ☑ Describe key legislation and statutory guidance that determines their personal safeguarding role, including the mandatory reporting duty
- ☑ Understand the process for requesting an FGM Protection Order in England and Wales
- ☑ Be clear about the roles of key services & improve multiagency working
- ☑ Consider how to effectively and sustainably engage with girls, boys, their families and communities
- ☑ Gain confidence in dealing with cases of FGM
- Increase skills in making robust referrals which always highlight the voice of the child
- ☑ Consider how to engage communities on the issues

- Explore gaps in local provision and how to address these

Workshops for students

Bespoke sessions

Aim: To empower educate and empower students to take action against FGM

These workshops have been designed to educate students on their rights. FGM, and signpost to relevant support services. Lesson content is adapted to key stages following a spiral curriculum and complement existing teaching in the school.

By the end of secondary school, students should know and understand:

- ☑ The physical and emotional damage caused by FGM
- ☑ That it is a criminal offence to perform or assist in the performance of FGM

Whilst teaching FGM in primary settings is optional, we encourage all schools to teach about the topic from the earliest opportunity from key stage 1 to identify and protect girls at risk

earlier, and empower the next generation to speak out about the issue.

- Lessons are interactive with activities an overall 'fun' learning experience for pupils
- Lessons include teaching around human rights, violence against girls and women and societal attitudes towards girls and women including the concept of 'honour', body rights, leading to the teaching of FGM
- Teaching specifically on FGM includes identifying risk, the physical and emotional health consequences of FGM & the law on FGM, as well as where pupils can access support
- Every student will receive a pack of resources, including a badge from the Centre which says 'I will fight to #EndFGM' as well as a sticker of their choice

FGM Assessment Tool

Training for Social Workers

1/2 Day Full Day



Aim: To enable confident use of the National FGM Centre's FGM Assessment Tool to enhance professional risk assessments of FGM cases.

The National FGM Centre's (NFGMC) <u>FGM Assessment Tool</u> is an innovative and independently evaluated tool for social workers and other professionals to use, complementary to their current assessment methods, to enhance professional judgment by enabling holistic thinking about safety and risk factors.

The FGM Assessment Tool is based on the three domains of the social work: the child's developmental needs, parenting capacity and family and environmental factors.

The NFGMC Risk Assessment Tool comprises of:

A comprehensive guidance on working around FGM.

An online assessment tool which enables social workers to assess the FGM case, reflect on the recommendations and put safety plans in place.

Learning outcomes:

- Gain a greater understanding about what FGM is, reasons for the practice, prevalence and the impact on girls' and women's lives including the physical and emotional health consequences
- To be able to apply holistic safeguarding including of other harmful practices to cases
- ☑ Gain confidence in exploring concerns of FGM with girls and parents/carers
- More confident to develop safety plans with girls and families
- ☑ Gain increased confidence and preparation skills to carry out an FGM assessment in a timely manner
- Be able to use the FGM Assessment Tool in ongoing assessments with families, including during the application of FGM Protection Orders

Aim: To equip delegates with the knowledge and skills to deliver FGM training

Day 1: Delegates attend NFGMC's full day CPD advanced training

Day 2: Practical day

Learning outcomes:

Increased knowledge regarding FGM, including what the practice is within the framework of harmful practices, reasons for the practice, prevalence and the impact on girls' and women's lives including the physical and emotional health consequences

Protecting Children and Vulnerable Adults from Abuse Linked to Faith or Belief

1/2 Day Full Day



Aim: To equip professionals with the knowledge and confidence to recognise and deal with child abuse linked to faith and belief.

The stories of Victoria Climbie, Ayesha Ali, Kristy Bamu, and Khyra Ishaq (to name a few) highlighted that child abuse linked to faith and belief is another hidden form of abuse that professionals should be aware of.

The 'National Action Plan to Tackle Child Abuse Linked to Faith or Belief' (2012) focuses on the belief in concepts of witchcraft and spirit possession; demons or the devil acting through children or leading them astray; the evil eye or djinns and dakini; ritual or muti murders; and the use of belief in magic or witchcraft to create fear in children to make them more compliant when they are being trafficked for domestic slavery or sexual exploitation.

Working with cultural and economic diversity and safeguarding children Multi Agency Training

Full Day

2 Days



Aim: To provide an opportunity to explore personal influences and good practice issues when working with children and their families from a range of cultural and economic backgrounds whilst maintaining a focus on the safety of children.

- Explore the <u>challenges and opportunities</u> of working with children and families from a range of different cultural, religious, ethnic and economic backgrounds
- Explore <u>different cultural and religious belief systems and child care practices</u> within different groups, the impact of these on parenting and the protective factors that may be associated with these.

- Recognise the <u>impact of discrimination</u> on children and families from particular cultural and economic groups
- Consider their <u>personal attitudes and beliefs</u> and how these may impact on their interventions with families whose backgrounds are different to their own
- Develop skills in <u>distinguishing between cultural practices</u> that are not harmful to children and those that are
- Develop a <u>basic awareness of a range of practices</u> that are specific to certain communities which may be harmful to children including e.g. corporal punishment, female genital mutilation, forced marriage and spirit belief
- ☑ Develop skills in <u>assessing the strengths of families</u> from all cultural backgrounds whilst ensuring that areas of risk are identified and addressed
- Consider how different personal and professionals beliefs and attitudes can impact on <u>multi-agency working</u>
- ☑ Consider where to seek advice about different cultures

Aim: To provide an opportunity to explore personal influences and good practice when working with children and their families from a range of cultural backgrounds, and exploring how these impact safeguarding

- ☑ Explore the challenges and opportunities of working with children and families from a range of different cultural, religious and ethnic backgrounds - exploring ways to use them as strengths in assessments
- Explore different cultural and religious belief systems and child care practices within different groups, the impact of

- these on parenting and the protective factors that may be associated with these, considering ways to consider and explore them as strengths in assessments
- ✓ Develop skills in <u>distinguishing between cultural practices</u> that are not harmful to children and those that are
- ☑ Consider personal attitudes and beliefs and how these may impact on your interventions with families whose backgrounds are different to your own
- ☑ Develop skills in <u>assessing the strengths of families</u> from all cultural backgrounds whilst ensuring that areas of risk are identified and addressed

Harmful Practices and Safeguarding Children

Aim: This course is designed to equip participants with an understanding of harmful practices, to critically analyse safeguarding concerns and how to respond to children who are at risk.

- An understanding around what harmful practices are along with the international and national debates
- An overview of the <u>range of harmful practices</u> including those known to be taking locally and nationally
- An awareness of the <u>signs and symptoms</u> associated with different harmful practices

- Explore key messages from policy, research and serious case reviews
- Explore <u>risk factors</u>, <u>how to assess risk</u> and <u>how to respond</u> appropriately to concerns
- ☑ Be made aware of the <u>roles and responsibilities</u> of agencies
- ☑ Considered where to access resources and services
